

DARE TO DREAM

Dear Friends,

Can we dare to dream of a world where cancer is no longer feared? Where it's a disease that has a cure? Where the majority are survivors and not victims. Yes, we can. The Indian Cancer Society with renewed vigour and zeal is striving to turn this dream into a reality.

As India's most respected NGO in the cancer space for the past 65 years, we play an active role in creating awareness and encouraging early detection among the masses. Facilitating cure, rehabilitation for the underprivileged patients and offering support to survivors has always been our area of focus.

It is time now to scale up our activities, set new goals for 2020. A national footprint should see us manning 100 mobile detection vans throughout the country creating cancer awareness through films developed on key cancers in the regional languages and providing early detection at your doorstep. The youth of our country must lead the change of mindset towards this dreaded disease through social media and events. Raising Rs 100 crores for disbursement through the Cancer Cure Fund will make the life-saving treatment available to many of those who simply cannot afford it.

To this end, in the past one year, we have produced 4 films in 7 languages raising awareness and encouraging early detection. Students, young professionals and matinee idol - Varun Dhawan - have been enrolled to be part of our mission. CSR funding has enabled us to add a new state-of-the-art mobile medical unit detection van, currently under fabrication, to increase our reach in the rural areas.

To further increase the impact of our Cancer Cure Fund, in collaboration with HDFC AMC, we have added 7 hospitals to our empanelled list, which now totals 14 across India. Since its establishment in 2011 we have sanctioned 87.13 crores, to fund the treatment of 3418 patients. We have now nearly quadrupled our disbursements with the enhanced new fund and CSR support from HDFC. In fact, this dimension of the ICS success story has evoked a Harvard Business School case study. ICS has also reorganized its operating structure by identifying 4 core areas – Awareness & Screening, Cancer Cure, Cancer Registry responsible for research and knowledge, and Rehabilitation and Survivorship, which includes the Ugam – support group of childhood cancer survivors.

Integrated planning and execution with our Branches is the key to help realize this dream.

The need of the hour is to come together from all walks of life, pool in our resources to battle this disease and emerge victorious. We seek active support and assistance from individual donors, trusts, the corporate world, medical fraternity, hospitals, the government, health ministry, well-wishers, stakeholders and all related NGOs to help scale-up our activities.

The next 5 years will help ICS take the giant leap to realize this dream.

Indian Cancer Society was established in 1951 by Dr. D.J. Jussawalla and Mr. Naval Tata as India's first voluntary, non-profit, national organization for Awareness, Screening, Cure and Survivorship of those affected with this disease.

Indian Cancer Society has been doing sterling work in fighting cancer across India. It has been and continues to be the beacon of hope for thousands of our poor cancer affected brethren. The extent of help required is phenomenal. The society is entirely dependent on public support for its various activities including for financing the treatment and rehabilitation of cancer patients and for spreading the cancer awareness of its early detection.

Activities

- Creating nationwide awareness of cancer, tobacco as a risk factors, survivorship, and encouraging regular checkups for early detection increasing the chances of cure and economic burden of treatment in an advanced stage.
- Providing for the early detection of cancer through cancer screening centers and mobile cancer Screening camps across India, for the underprivileged.
- Providing funds for the treatment of cancer for poor cancer patients across India through empanelled hospital
- Providing support during and after treatment to poor cancer patients through accommodation, rehabilitation, and survivor support groups.
- Gathering and collating data through the population based cancer registry for Mumbai, Pune, Nagpur and Aurangabad (ICS is the only NGO to run a cancer registry), and providing analytic and projected reports on the incidence of cancer.
- Providing a medium for the dissemination of information and research findings to the medical fraternity through the Indian Journal of Cancer

CANCER AWARENESS

Our mission: To create awareness that cancer is preventable and better managed if detected at an early stage.

Indian Cancer Society conducts cancer awareness camps in school, colleges, corporate offices, slum and rural areas on a pan India level.

At these camps, a trained ICS representative presents short films and a talk on the lead cancers like cervical, breast, oral and lung. The films explain what is cancer and its causes, symptoms and the lifestyle changes required to protect oneself against cancer. These camps are conducted free or at a minimal cost.

Anti Tobacco Initiatives:

The Indian Cancer Society has always been on the forefront of creating awareness for cancer and its risk factor. One such major risk factor is Tobacco. As per the Global Adult Tobacco Survey 2016, the average age of initiation of tobacco use in India is 18.9 years, this means many of them start quite early, may be in their school years. ICS has an exclusive Anti tobacco initiative for School Children, which conducted about 184 talks in the year 2016 - 17. These talks were conducted in both urban and rural areas across India covering the cities of Sagar, Indore, Amritsar, Nasik, Pune, Jaipur, Delhi, Patna and Aurangabad to name a few.

Ganpati Festival Anti-Tobacco Campaign :

On the auspicious occasion of Ganpati Festival, Indian Cancer Society is launched a major anti-tobacco drive with a view to encourage and motivate people to give up consuming tobacco in any form. Cancer caused due to tobacco consumption is the highest killer in India. Almost 40% of the cancers detected each year are tobacco related. ICS coined a catchy slogan “Chala Tambaku Soduya, Ganapati Bappa Morya” and banners with this slogan were put up at prominent Mandals during the festival in 2016. This campaign is also being promoted aggressively through social media.

Impact: Banners with this slogan were displayed at 35 mandals and 102 Police Stations across Mumbai, a film made especially for social media promotion received 1.25L views.

RELAY FOR LIFE



Relay For Life is a community sensitization program, where we make the community aware about cancer, its early detection and prevention. It is also a community based fundraising event; to raise the much needed funds for underprivileged cancer patients.

The Relay For Life teams, camp out overnight and take turns walking or running around a track or path at their school. Events are 12 hours long, and since, Cancer never sleeps, each team is asked to have at least one participant on the track, during the entire event.



CANCER SCREENING

Our mission: To facilitate the early detection of cancer

Indian Cancer Society strongly believes that “Cancer is curable, when detected early.” Awareness followed by early detection improves the chances of battling this dreaded disease. Early diagnosis of cancer has been the core objective of our Mobile Cancer Screening Camps and the Cancer Screening Centre at Peddar Road, Mumbai.

Mobile Cancer Screening Camps

In 1982, Indian Cancer Society launched its first Mobile Cancer Screening to provide people with easy access to cancer checkup facilities free or at a nominal cost.

The Mumbai Police were very supportive of this campaign, the aim of which was to inculcate health directed behaviour in them.

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CANCER CURE

Our mission: To offer emotional support and medical aid to cancer patients

Cancer Cure Fund

Cancer Cure Fund (CCF) is a flagship project of ICS which provides financial aid for treatment to underprivileged cancer patients. This project provides financial aid up to Rs. 4 lacs per patient to undergo treatment and emerge a victor. This project has transformed the lives of over 2500 underprivileged cancer patients across the country, many of whom have completed their treatment and returned to productive life once again.

This project is unique, first of its kind initiative of ICS in collaboration with HDFC AMC Ltd. In February 2011, HDFC AMC launched a Debt Mutual fund which gave the investors an option to donate 50% or 100% of their dividend income from this mutual fund to ICS to fund the treatment cost for underprivileged cancer patients.

In FY 2016-17, ICS CCF received donations aggregating to Rs. 10.12 crores from over 2500 investors from the Debt fund. In addition, HDFC AMC also contributed Rs.11.86 crores as their CSR contribution.

ICS is grateful to each of those 2500 investors of this fund who have donated their income to ICS and have helped transform the lives of these patients through the CCF Project. ICS would also like to place on record its gratitude to HDFC AMC for launching this unique product that has enabled ICS to raise the funds required for this project.




ICS has implemented this at a pan India level and we are pleased to report that 80% of the beneficiaries are less than 30 years of age.

Looking at the success of the project other corporate such as SBI Foundation, Union Bank of India have also contributed, taking the total donation of FY 16-17 to Rs. 23.77 crore.

Navin Bhuva



16 year old Navin Bhuva from Porbandar, Gujarat was pursuing his studies with the aim becoming an engineer one day. He enjoyed playing with his friends in his free time, until one day when he had severe joint pain and was difficult for him to walk or travel to his college. Local doctor suggested CT and Bone scan, after which he was diagnosed with Osteosarcoma, a type of Bone cancer. 'All my hopes had trashed. I had only heard about cancer but never thought I would be the victim. I doubt if I will ever be able to run again', were his thoughts. Navin was a Fighter and wanted to achieve his dreams. His parents took him to Kailash Cancer Hospital, Goraj, Gujarat. His initial treatment started with the monetary support from relatives and friends. But continuing the treatment was difficult as they couldn't afford the remaining treatment of surgery and prosthesis which was costing around 2.4 lacs. 'Arranging this amount for a daily wagger like me, was next to impossible. We had almost decided to discontinue the treatment and go back to village, when the social worker of the hospital, told us about ICCF. They said that my son's case has been approved by ICS and they would be taking care of his treatment cost. I was overjoyed and couldn't believe in my fortune' said Navin's father. Navin now 17 years, fought the battle of cancer and has appeared for his 12th exams this year. 'ICCF may have helped many patients like me but I will always be thankful to them as, when all the doors were closed it was ICCF who helped me and now I can pursue my dreams of becoming an engineer', says Navin with a bright smile on his face.

Navaneetham



Grandma Navaneetham, 58 years old today lives happily with her 13 grandchildren! But this wasn't the situation a year back, when she was diagnosed with Breast cancer. She feels hardship is her name. When 11, she became a victim of child marriage and married a 35 year old man as his second wife. This didn't stop her from being a good wife. She raised her 4 kids and tried to fulfill all their needs. She couldn't get her childhood back but was happy with her family, till the time she complained about her pain in the breast. The local clinic detected a lump in her left breast and diagnosed it as a malignant tumor. Her family insisted her to visit CMC, Vellore and they were glad that they went there, as they got treatment assistance from ICCF of Rs.1 lac. 'I can't stop thanking god for saving my mother. ICCF has been a boon to needy people like us. I smile when I see my mother playing with my children', says her elder son.

Dr. Arun Kurkure Initiation and Treatment Fund

AKITF is an emergency funding project of Indian Cancer Society, which takes care of the diagnostic tests and gives initial treatment funding to underprivileged poor cancer patients. This project was introduced to reduce the drop rate of patients from starting/postponing the treatment or not undergoing tests due to affordability.

Initiation Fund: This fund is given to underprivileged patients who are unable to afford the initial costs of diagnosis at the Cancer Hospital. An amount of Rs. 15,000/- is given to the hospital so that the patient can undergo all the required initial tests at the hospital for their diagnosis. The objective is to enable them to do the various tests to determine the diagnosis. If this is not done, they may go back home only to return to the hospital with the cancer in an advanced state.

Treatment Fund: This fund is given to underprivileged patients so that certain part of their cancer treatment costs gets covered. An amount of Rs. 5,000 or 10,000/- is given after the completion of the due diligence process done by our social workers. We hope that by funding a part of the treatment, it will give them time to seek for other funding resources.

Sir Ratan Tata Trust (SRTT)

In December 2009, ICS partnered with Sir Ratan Tata Trust, for providing financial aid to the underprivileged cancer patients undergoing treatment at the Tata Memorial Hospital & the Bai Jerbai Wadia Hospital.

Under this project, Indian Cancer Society refers patients to SRTT. The patient applications are thoroughly scrutinized by medical social worker of ICS in accordance with the strict guidelines laid down by SRTT and are then sent to SRTT for evaluation and acceptance.

Personal Background and Impact

Master. Nitesh Bholu Rana is a 6 year old boy from Jharkhand. His father is a laborer and earns monthly income of Rs. 8000/- There are four members in his family and their financial condition is quite poor.

Nitesh's fever was not reducing for more than 15 days and hence his father took him to a bigger hospital in Ranchi. He was given 2 bottle of blood and after his blood sample was tested, he was diagnosed with a type of

blood cancer. The hospital referred them to Tata Memorial Hospital (TMH). TMH social worker sent this case to ICS and after a quick due diligence we gave them Rs.15,000/- for the initial test. Nitesh was then diagnosed with Pre B Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia and immediately started his treatment. He has completed 2 cycles of chemotherapy. However Nitesh has developed infections and hence his 3rd chemo has been postponed. The TMH social workers meanwhile are arranging for his funding of the balance treatment cost.

Personal Background and Impact

Mr. Dipesh Nagandhi, 46 year old from Mumbai works as a Security guard and earns monthly income of Rs. 3000/-. He is the bread winner of his family comprising of five members.

One day he developed severe pain in his stomach. The local doctor on sonography detected lump and advised him to go to Tata Memorial Hospital (TMH).

The reports diagnosed him to be suffering from Hodgkin's Lymphoma. Post diagnoses,

TMH informed him that his total cost of treatment would be about Rs 40,000. This treatment cost included chemotherapy and supportive medicines. Dipesh approached ICS for help and received an amount of Rs 10,000/- to start his treatment. With this amount his first chemo was done and he received immediate relief. Further, ICS has ensured that the balance treatment cost will be taken care by TMH social workers.

Dipesh is extremely thankful to ICS for this timely help.



Sir Ratan Tata Trust - Case Studies

Ms. Jaya Kumari



Ms. Jaya Kumari, 30 years old from Bhagalpur, Bihar, comes from a poor family. Her husband works as a laborer. She was diagnosed with Ca Breast and the doctors at Tata Memorial Hospital had suggested to go with Target Therapy which would cost about Rs. 4 lacs.

However the family decided to quit the treatment as they couldn't afford the cost of the treatment. ICS after scrutinizing the case decided to refer to SRTT, where the case got sanctioned. Jaya started off her treatment and is currently on maintenance treatment and is very thankful to ICS that they helped her when required.

Mr. Tulsi Singh



Mr. Tulsi Singh 35 years old is from Bihar. His background is of a farmer and earns Rs. 40k annually. He was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia, a type of blood cancer and the doctors from Tata Memorial Hospital, gave an approx cost estimate of Rs. 6 lacs for treatment.

ICS picked his case and decided to refer to SRTT where he got a sanction of Rs. 2.5 lacs. The balance amount of treatment cost was taken care by other trusts at the hospital. Because of this help, Tulsi was able to complete his treatment and is now on his follow up. He is very thankful to ICS and says because of the timely help from ICS, he is able to lead a normal life with his family.

Different types of breast prosthesis, cervical cancer kits, jaw stretcher keys, limb prosthesis and colostomy sets are made at this one of a kind workshop and are sold to patients all over the country at a nominal cost. They are provided free of cost to the underprivileged.

SELF RELIANT SURVIVOR PROJECT supported by GSK

Our mission: *To help the families to become self reliant*

Cancer patients come to Mumbai from all over the country for treatment at TMH. For many of them it is a life of hardship with no place to stay and no means of sustenance. The Self Reliant Survivor Project of ICS supported by GSK helps such families to live with dignity and to learn a new skill for earning a livelihood.

Patients or their dependents are trained in tailoring for up to six months. This enables them to return to their villages with a new source of income for the family. During the training they are provided a daily stipend, meals, reimbursement of accommodation and travel expenses, food supplements and rations for the month. The biggest gain is to be able to live with dignity while the patient is under treatment and to learn a new skill.



Distribution of cancer in Male & Female - Mumbai 2014



Distribution of cancer in Male & Female - Pune 2015



Distribution of cancer in Male & Female - Aurangabad 2016





CANCER SURVIVORSHIP

ICS has been rehabilitating cancer survivors through its survivorship program. Project PICASSO (Partnership in Cancer Survivorship Optimization), was launched by ICS in partnership with HES Infra Pvt Ltd under their CSR activity. ICS has created a module to be implemented at cancer hospitals in Mumbai in its first phase. In the first phase, the focus would be on educational and vocational issues of childhood and young cancer survivors following which ICS may roll out the module to adult cancer survivors.

The intent of Survivorship program is to strengthen the care connections and co-ordination of services for cancer survivors to ensure that continuing care needs are met during the survivorship phase of the cancer.

UGAM

UGAM is a support group of childhood cancer survivors the youngest unit of (ICS) under its survivorship program. UGAM means “To Rise”, underscoring the determination of childhood cancer survivors, to rise above all obstacles in life & be VICTORS. Ugam was launched in 2009 on the first Sunday of June celebrated as Cancer Survivors Day across the world as a mark of celebration of life. More than 250 survivors are registered at Ugam from its inception.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA:

Childhood Cancer Survivors more than 14 years of age and more than 2 years from completion of cancer therapy with disease free status and registered at ACT(After completion of Therapy) Clinics of Tata Memorial Hospital (TMH) . Ugam is expanding its wings to include survivors from ACT clinic of pediatric units at other hospitals.

What we do ?

- Create awareness about curability of childhood cancers
- Help childhood cancer survivors to begin new life after cancer treatment and to make them aware that there can be and there is “normal life” after winning the battle with cancer
- Promote the importance of monitoring the late effects of cancer therapies.
- Advocate against discrimination in society to cancer survivors.
- Highlight the need of public support for the cause of Childhood cancer survivors.
- Monthly UGAM Meeting is conducted last Sunday of every month at ICS.

HIGHLIGHTS ON EVENTS/ACTIVITIES

- **7th Anniversary Celebrations:**

National Cancer Survivors Day® is an annual, treasured Celebration of Life that is held in hundreds of communities nationwide in the USA, and around the world, on the first Sunday in June. Ugam celebrates its anniversary every year on this day. Gujrat was the theme for this year for the cultural program. Celebrities were invited from Popular TV serial Tarak Mehta ka Oolta chashma with whom more than 150 ugam members enjoyed! Annual newsletter was released on that day.

- Following the survivor's day, International Childhood Cancer Survivors Week (ICCSW) is celebrated with different campaigns every year. This year Ugam organized Career guidance sessions and aptitude testing for childhood cancer survivors.

- **September 2016 : Childhood Cancer awareness month** was celebrated with children from TMH,Wadia and Nair hospital.Drawing competition was held for them.

- **International Childhood Cancer Day (ICCD):**

ICS is an associate member of CCI (Childhood Cancer International) and had following events on 15th February 2017:

1. Counselling session by Ugam Members at Wadia Hospital.
2. Dance Movement Therapy: Ugam organized a DMT session at ICS Multi-activity centre for children with cancer who are under treatment with an objective of making the patients feel comfortable with their bodies and mind.
3. Media Coverage: FM Radio: Interview of Dr Kurkure and Ugam member Shalaka was broadcasted.

- **Youth Development Modules By Tata strive/Edubridge:**

Ugam organized an Orientation session for the benefit of young cancer survivors on Sunday 26th March. It was a TataStrive initiative with the objective of reintegrating survivors into society by rebuilding their confidence and enabling them to resume normal workinglives. Nikhil Nair,ICs Volunteer, worked out the proposal for Ugam through Edubridge Learning (training partner of Tatastrive). 45 young cancer survivors attended the program. The first batch of BPO course has started from May 2017 at Mahatma Phule College for 10 ugam members who will be placed at jobs after a training of 6 weeks.

- **SelfV HCG Survivors Campaign:**

Out of 300 cancer survivors who had participated all over India, Ugam members Rahul Pandey and Shewta Chawre's Selfv were shortlisted in the top 10 inspirational videos. They were felicitated by the HCG survivors group held in Bangalore.

They provide emotional support to cancer patients and care-givers and equip them to tide over the difficult times in their fight against cancer. ICS has been providing this service at five hospitals in Bengaluru in addition to those who reach out to us directly.

- individual one-to-one sessions with the cancer patient
- sessions together with cancer patient’s partner, relative or caregiver
- telephone-based sessions if the cancer patient is unable to attend
- session at cancer patients home if they are unable to attend

RISK FACTORS OF OVARIAN CANCER

Age
The risk of developing ovarian cancer gets higher with age. Ovarian cancer is rare in women younger than 40. Most ovarian cancers develop after menopause.

Reproductive history
Women who have their first full-term pregnancy after age 35 or who never carried a pregnancy to term have a higher risk of ovarian cancer.

Family history
Ovarian cancer risk is increased if your mother, sister, or daughter has had Ovarian Cancer. A family history of some other types of cancer such as colorectal and breast cancer is linked to an increased risk of ovarian cancer.

Obesity
An obese woman (those with a body mass index of at least 30) have a higher risk of developing ovarian cancer.

Hormone replacement therapy
Any increase in cancer risk is very small.

Family cancer syndromes
About 5 to 10% of ovarian cancers are a part of family cancer syndromes resulting from inherited changes (mutations) in certain genes.

Fertility drugs
Fertility drugs seem to increase the risk of ovarian cancer. The risk seemed to be highest in women who did not get pregnant while on the drug.

Signs and symptoms of PROSTATE CANCER

1. Problems urinating
2. Slow or weak urinary stream
3. The need to urinate often, especially at night
4. Blood in the urine or semen
5. Erectile dysfunction
6. Pain in the hips, back, chest or other areas
7. Weakness or numbness in the legs or feet, or loss of bladder or bowel control
