What looked to be a simple case of vomiting – indigestion turned out to be a distressing diagnosis; of acute leukemia - type of blood cancer. The traumatized mother's heart sank to the depths of despair. She dreaded the pain her son would have to undergo, but, she even more feared the thought that her poor financial condition would not give her child a fair chance to survive and fight the deadly disease. In these stressful conditions, ICS through its **Cancer Cure Fund (CCF)** came in the form of much needed and timely financial help for Azar. This brought back relief on the face of Shehnaz as she sees her son smiling and responding well to treatment.

What will 54 year old Swapana, a home maker decide when she's just been diagnosed of CANCER? Spend what ever little her painter husband earns on her prohibitive medical treatment or spend that money on educating her children - her elder daughter is studying for Masters while her younger son is completing his Bachelors.

As a true Indian mother, she decided to give preference to educate her children even at the cost of losing her life. But, children chose the other way. They left their education mid-way and started the medical treatment of their mother. As months passed the financial condition worsened, the family again faced a existential crisis. Here, once again ICS CCF stepped in and took over the burden of medical expenses from the family. A happy family of father, mother, daughter and son express gratitude to ICS as Swapana recovers appreciatively post her successful surgery.

This is the story of lakhs of Azars and Swapanas who along with their families undergo the every day struggle of survival and their cancer treatment and ICS CCF has only been able to support a few for their treatment.

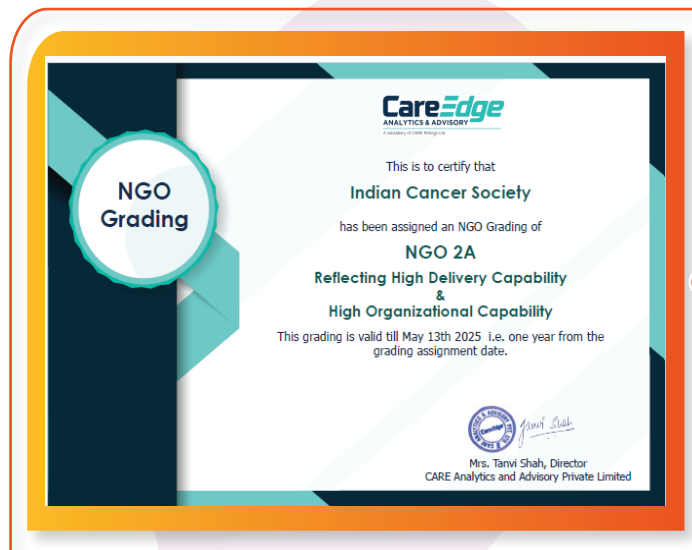

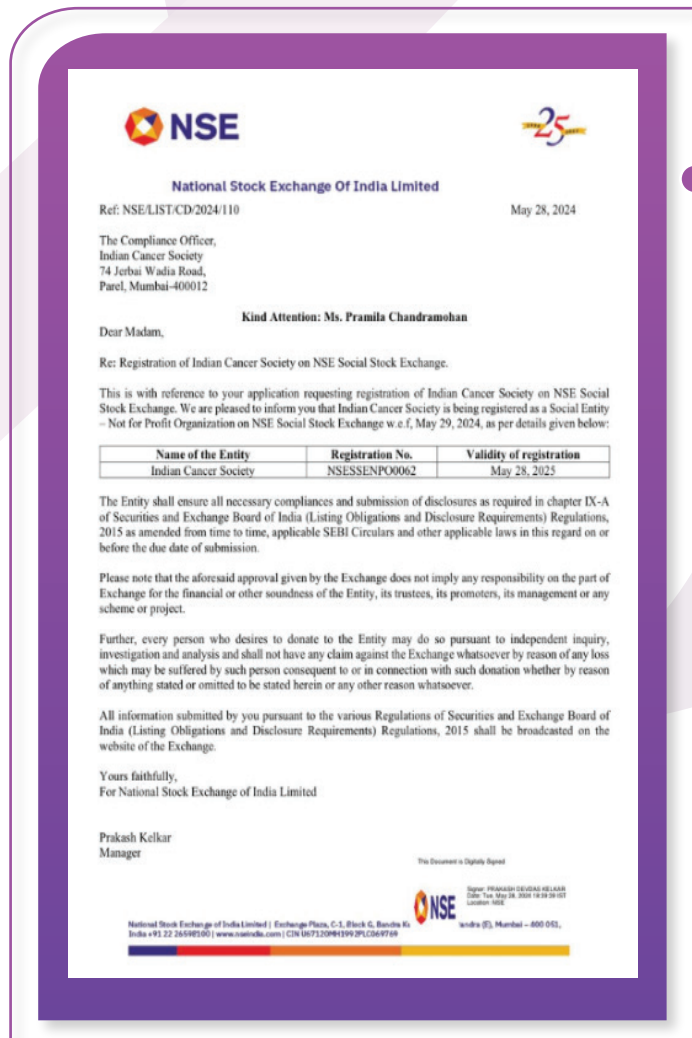
Indian Cancer Society has been doing sterling work in fighting cancer across India. It has been and continues to be the beacon of hope for thousands of underprivileged cancer patients.

NGO grading provides an expert opinion on institutional credibility in terms of organisational sustainability and programme effectiveness. NGO grading is a tool to identify NGOs with sound performance records after rigorous evaluation and due diligence. It is conducted by an independent organisation with unbiased opinion



The Cancer Cure Fund is one of the flagship project of the ICS which was launched in 2011 in collaboration with Indian Cancer Society(ICS), Tata Memorial Hospital(TMH) a leading institution in Oncology and HDFC Asset Management Company (HDFC AMC) a premier asset management company in India.

This fund is a unique, first of its kind philanthropic dedicated mutual fund approved by the securities market regulator with an intention to consistently generate funds for poor cancer patients across the country which has stood the test of time and has successfully completed 12 years.

The contribution to the mutual fund is capital protected and returned/renewed at the end of a three -year period. The annual dividend surrendered by the investor is donated to CCF for meeting whole or part of the cost of cancer treatment for the poor. From 2014, HDFC AMC matched the investors donation with an equal contribution as corporate social responsibility(CSR), effectively doubling the donation impact. In 2020, due to COVID-19, the scheme was paused.

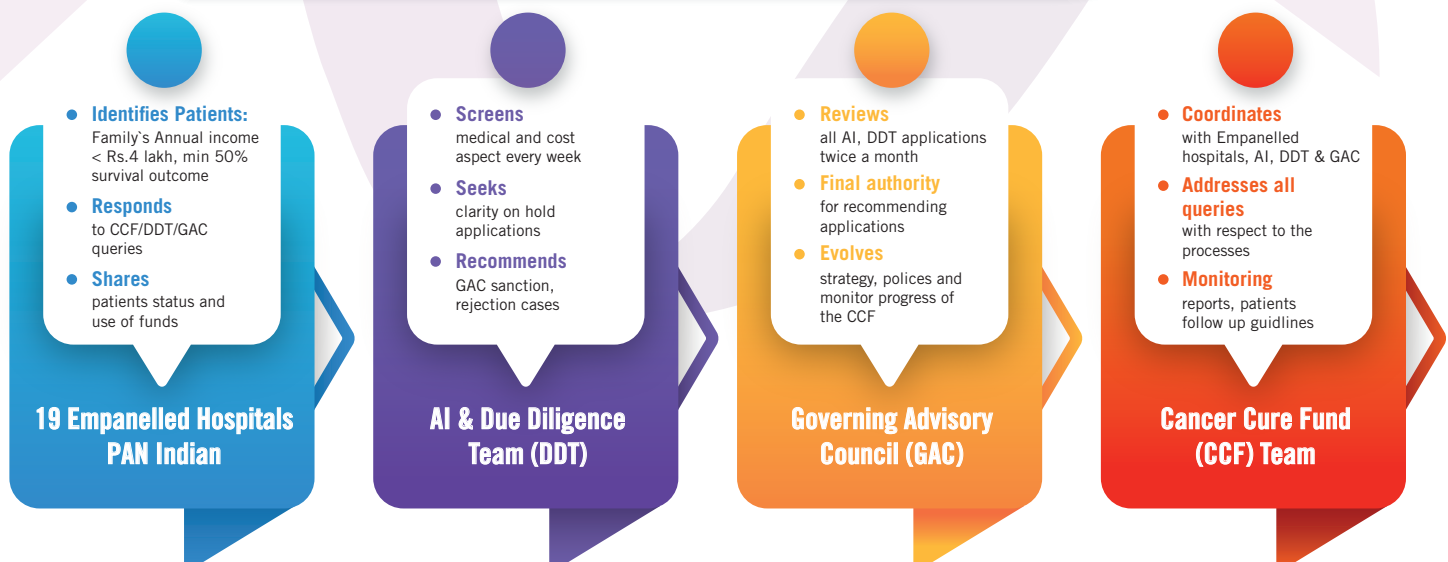
Thanks to the HDFC AMC team the fund has relaunched in 2023.

Investors now contribute 50% or 75% of the dividend income towards the fund.

The fund focuses on significant and timely financial assistance to cancer patients, aimed at curative treatment and standard of care through the ICS's Cancer Cure Fund (CCF) Project via its empanelled hospitals.

Hospital selection criteria include comprehensive standard of care, underserved location for cost reduction and affordable treatment. ICS Governing Advisory Council (GAC) regularly review these hospitals to ensure compliance with guidelines. Navya a clinically validated AI system, conducts initial screening of the applications received through these hospitals recommending those that fulfil 50% chance of survival. A Due Diligence Team (DDT) of top oncologists review applications that need further evaluation ensuring quality and affordable care, while maintaining a quick turn around time. Services from Navya, oncologists and the GAC are pro bono. Use of technology and operating guidelines enable standardized processes leading to transparency and accountability in fund utilization.

Method of utilising CANCER CURE FUND (CCF) MODEL



The ICS-Cancer Cure has by now successfully completed more than a decade of philanthropic service in saving thousands of precious cancer patients lives, and thereby leaving a positive impact not only in the lives of the patients but also of their families. This accomplishment is not just about the decade-long timeline but also about achieving over 50% success in patient survivorship, making the project even more fulfilling. Equally gratifying is to see the surviving patients lead normal and happy lives.

Delighted to announce that ICS – Cancer Cure Fund's innovative funding model is now published in the Indian Institute of Management – Ahmedabad Case Centre



ABSTRACT

Indian Cancer Society: Innovative Funding of Cancer Treatment More than 10 years and three investment rounds after it had created a new model for fundraising - through which more 5,000 donors had contributed towards a cause that had impacted 11, 054 lives, with a total disbursement of INR 184 crore until March 31, 2022 - the Indian Cancer Society (ICS) faced new challenges. The roadblock that had emerged in 2010 had raised its head once again in the form of the Covid - 19 pandemic in 2020. Net earnings on the huge amount of the corpus were close to negligible, and the dwindling interest and dividend rates had made it challenging to get a reasonable return. Earlier, dividends, from debt funds were tax - free for the investor and the Dividend Distribution Tax was payable by the fund. In 2020, these dividends became taxable in the hands of the recipient at their marginal tax rate. Thus, the mutual fund model adopted in 2010 was no longer practical for philanthropy funding. How would ICS continue to generate the funds that were required to not only sustain itself but also treat underprivileged patients with cancer, a disease whose treatment drained the pockets of even relatively affluent people?

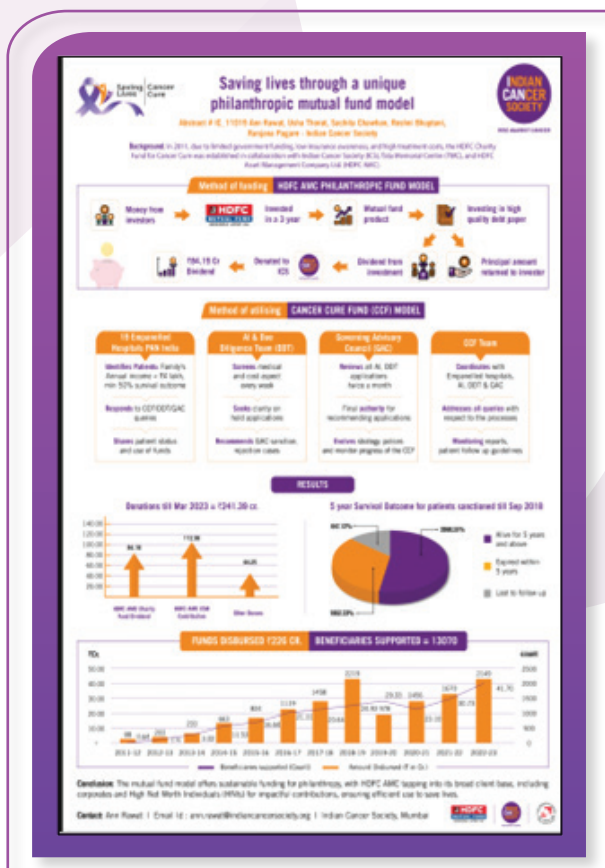

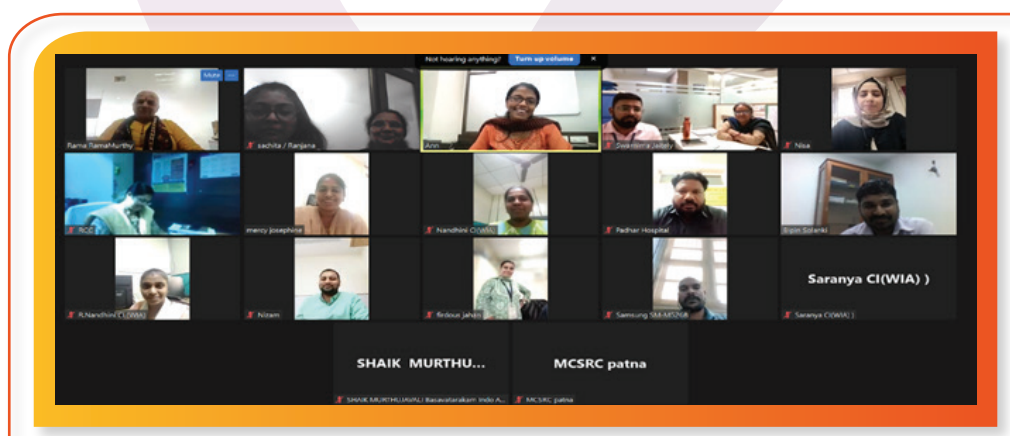

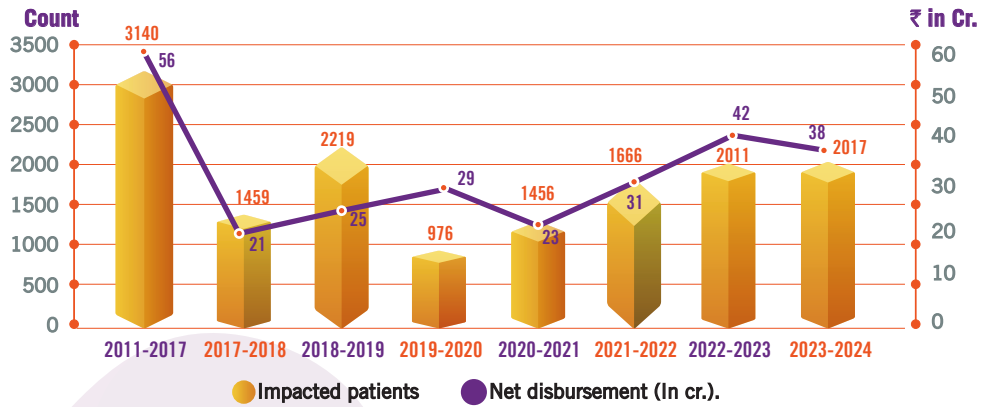
OTHER HIGHLIGHTS OF CANCER CURE

- Tata Memorial Hospital doctors Dr. Amit Joshi from Solid Tumor and Dr. Anant Gokarn of Haemat Oncology have joined as members of the Governing Advisory Council.
- ICS received the dividend of Rs.2.05 Cr. in 2023 through the 4th series of the HDFC Charity fund for Cancer Cure. Some of the top investors to the fund include HDFC Bank Ltd., HCL Capital Pvt. Ltd., Ultratech Cement Ltd., Exide Industries Ltd., HDFC AMC Ltd., Reliance Industries Ltd., Union Bank Of India, ICICI Bank Ltd. The next dividend is scheduled for release in May'24.
- Few of the CSR donations received from major corporates include contributions from HDFC AMC Rs.20.25 cr., ICICI Foundation was Rs.8.69 cr., support from Kotak Bank was Rs. 1.70 cr., Rs. 1.15 cr. from BPCL, Clearing Corp. of India was Rs.1cr, Kotak Securities Rs.70 lakh, Aditya Birla Capital Foundation Rs.50 lakh, A H Wadia Trust Rs.50 lakh, Brother International contributed Rs. 43 lakh, LG Rs. 42 lakh, STCI Finance Rs.30 lakh and STCI Primary Dealer Rs. 25 lakh.
- Audit conducted in 5 of the Cancer Cure empanelled hospitals viz. Cancer Institute and Christian Medical College – Tamil Nadu, Cachar Cancer Hospital – Assam, Mahavir Cancer Sansthan – Bihar and Baswatarakam Indo American Cancer Hospital - Telangana to ensure adherence to the guidelines and the processes by Mahajan and Aibara Chartered Accountants and LLP audit firm. Observation on the audit was shared with the hospitals.
- The Government of India has announced The Digital Personal Data Protection (DPDP) Act 2023 which holds significant implications for NGOs handling patient data. It mandates stringent measures to ensure the confidentiality, integrity, and security of personal health information. Indian Cancer Society is ensuring that it obtains explicit consent from patients for data collection, processing, and sharing, leading to transparency in how data is used. The Act also requires NGOs to implement robust data protection protocols and provide patients with rights to access, correct, and delete their data. Non-compliance can result in severe penalties, making it crucial for NGOs to align their data management practices. ICS is taking all possible measures to adhere to this Act to protect patient privacy and maintain trust.
- On March 29, 2024, a Zoom meeting was organised with all co-ordinators from the empanelled hospitals to recognize their contributions and support. They were given an overview of Cancer Cure's performance and challenges for 2023-24. Additionally, questions / issues expressed by attendees were addressed during the discussion.

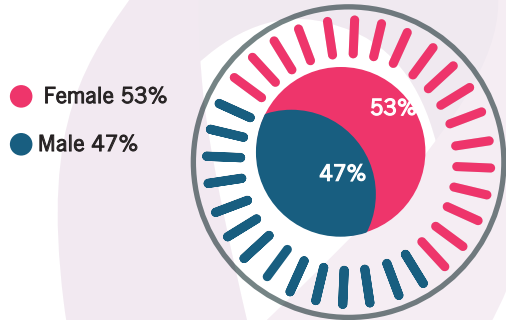

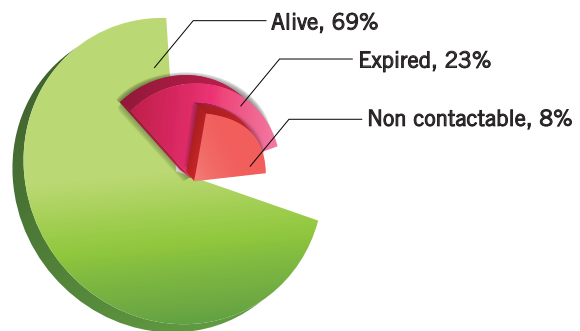
PATIENTS SUPPORTED 14944, FUNDS DISBURSED ₹ 269 cr.



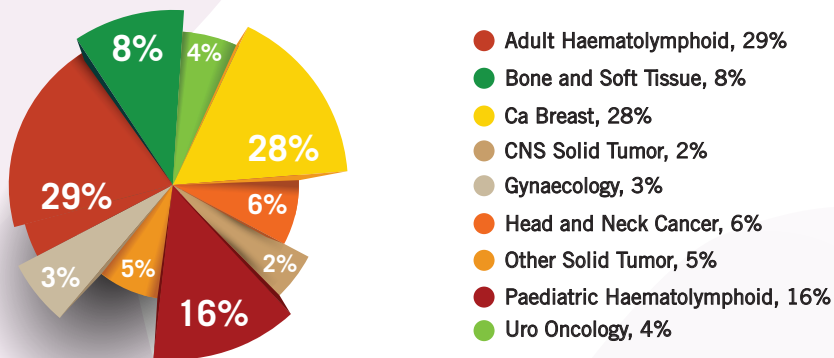
GENDER WISE PATIENTS SUPPORTED, N = 14944



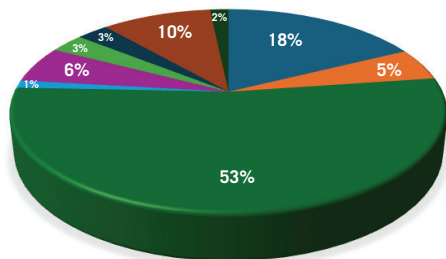
PATIENT STATUS %, N = 14944



DIAGNOSIS COUNT %, N = 14944

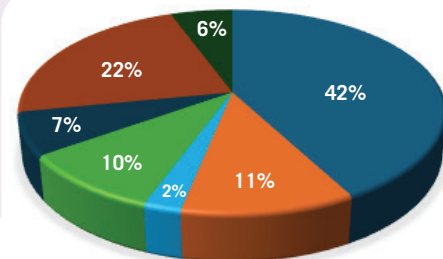


FEMALE BENEFICIARIES WITH CANCER, N = 7959



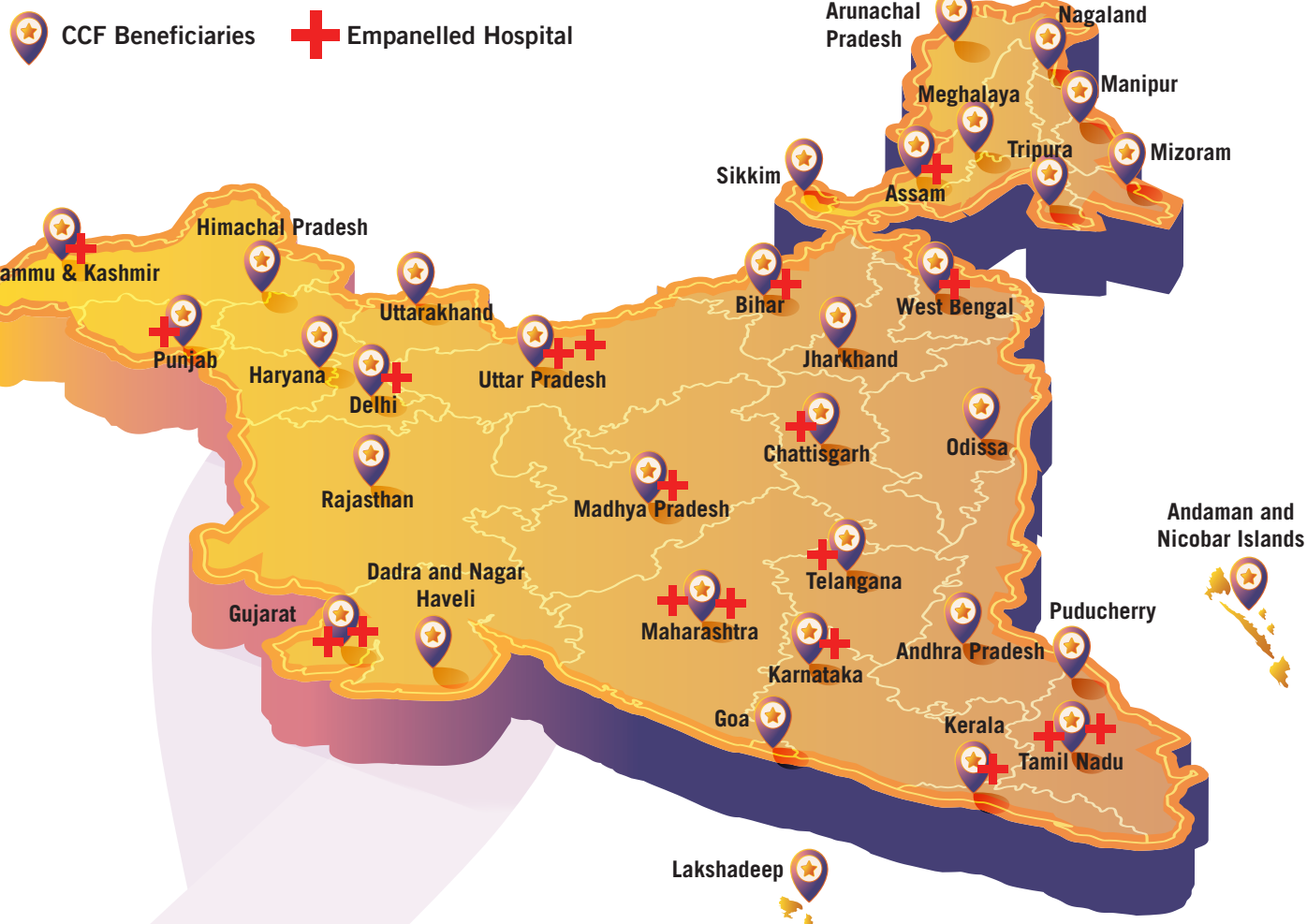

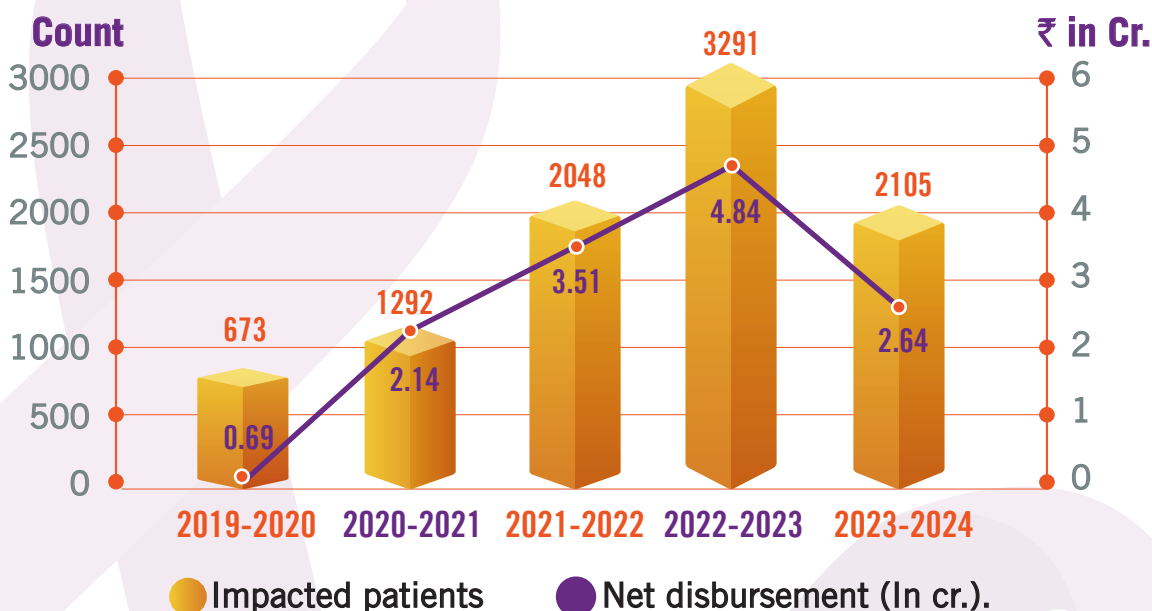
DR. ARUN KURKURE INITIATION AND TREATMENT FUND

The Dr. Arun Kurkure Initiation and Treatment fund (AKITF) continues to support patients who are unable to afford the initial investigations expenses followed by treatment cost. ICS is grateful to donors who continue to support us year on year. Since 2019, we have been able to impact the lives of 9,400 patients both genders being supported equally with an amount of Rs. 14 crores, Most of the patients fall under the age group greater than 45 years, majority of these patients were from Maharashtra.

When diagnosed 1% of the patients did not have cancer. The feedback by the hospitals and the patients confirmed that 85% have initiated the treatment off which 6% expired.

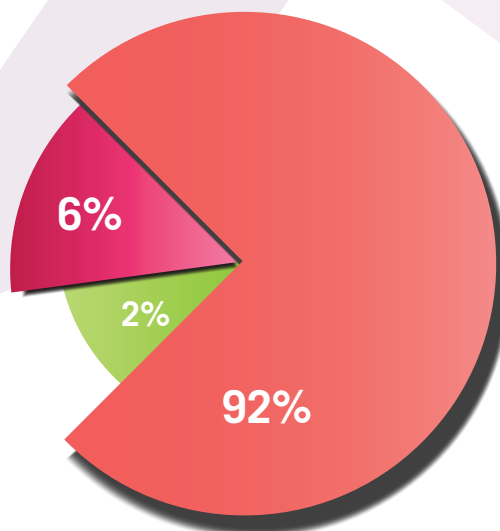

PATIENTS SUPPORTED 9408, FUNDS DISBURSED ₹ 13.84 cr.



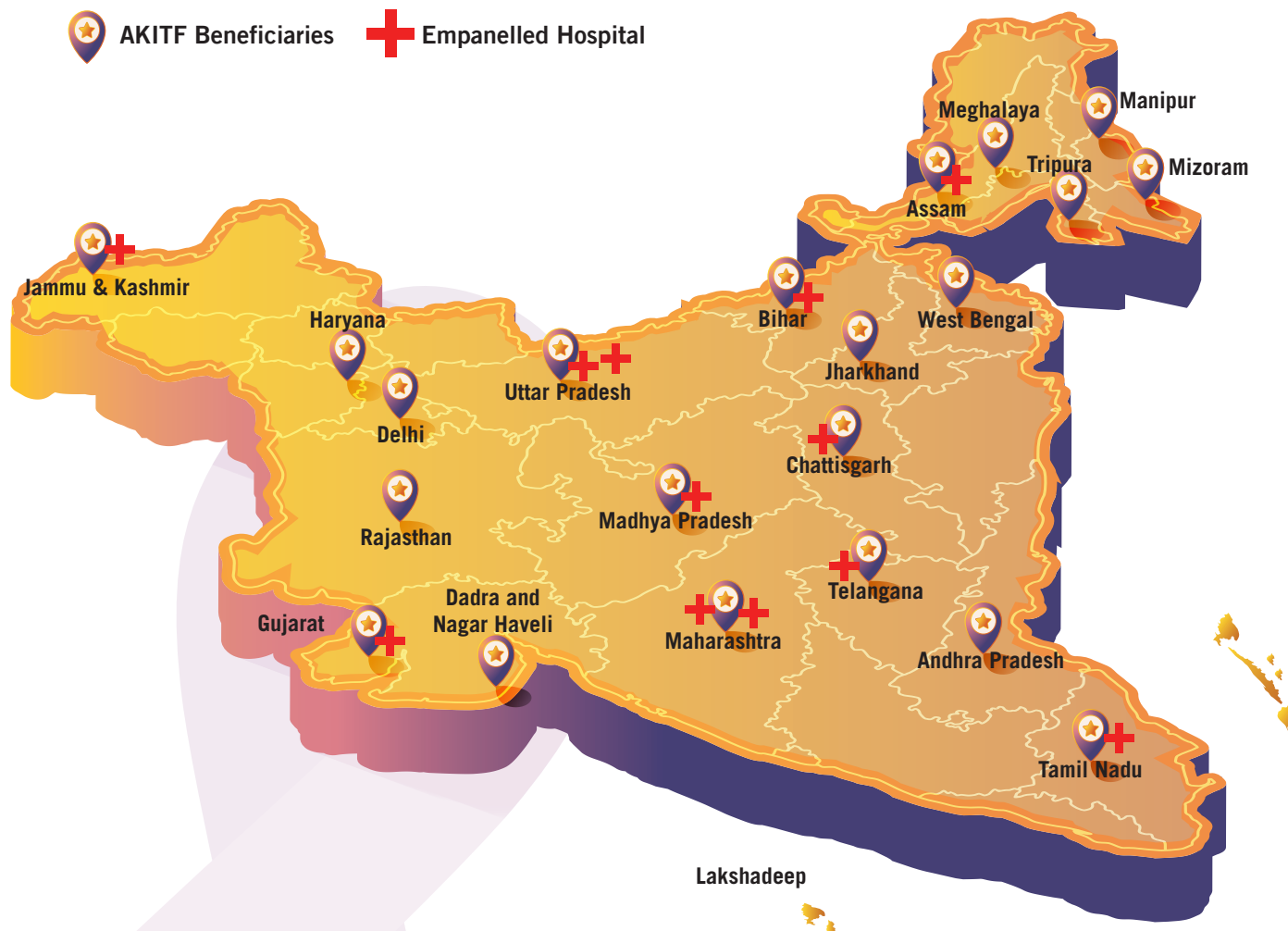
TREATMENT INITIATED BY 7997 PATIENTS

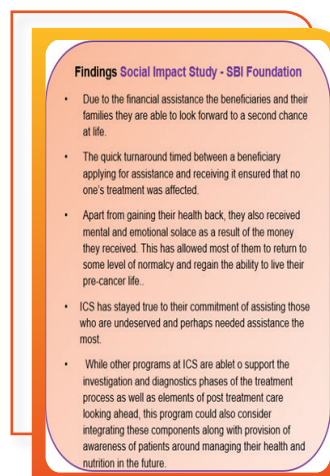
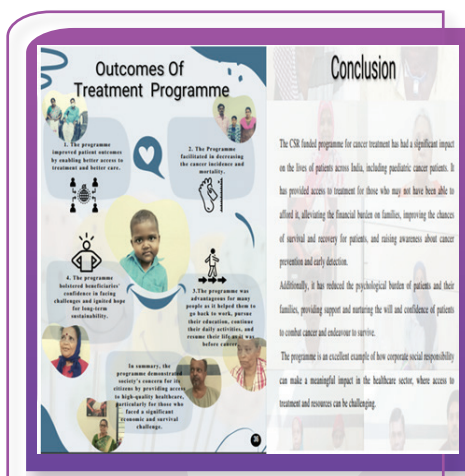

Name: Mr. Jayram Meher
Age and Gender: 28 years old and Male

Hospital: Tata Memorial Hospital, Mumbai
Diagnosis: Burkitt's Lymphoma



Jayaram Meher, a promising student hailing from Brahmandihi, Bargarh, found his life taking an unexpected turn when he was diagnosed with Burkitt's lymphoma at the tender age of 19, while pursuing his studies in the 12th grade. His family, with an annual income of only Rs. 18,000, faced a daunting challenge upon learning about his diagnosis and sought help from Tata Memorial Hospital in Mumbai for treatment. The estimated cost of treatment, seemed insurmountable for Jayaram's family. However, with unwavering determination and the assistance of social workers at Tata Memorial Hospital, Jayaram and his brother, secured financial support from ICS-CCF. Jayaram underwent treatment and successfully completed it in January 2014. Inspired by the compassion and support he received during his battle with cancer, Jayaram resolved to dedicate his life to serving his country. Despite the physical and emotional toll of his illness, he pursued his education and physical training diligently. In June 2021, he realized his dream by joining the Central Industrial Security Force (CISF). Jayaram's remarkable journey serves as a beacon of hope and resilience, not only for his family and village but for the entire nation. His brother, , acknowledges the pivotal role played by the Indian Cancer Society in their lives, describing it as a godsend that not only saved Jayaram's life but also improved their financial situation. Today, at 28 years old, Jayaram is stationed in Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh, serving his country with dedication and passion. Despite his demanding responsibilities, he remains committed to his two-year follow-up appointments, embodying the spirit of perseverance and inspiring others with his story of triumph over adversity.

Her husband, retired from a local bank, and their studying daughter were deeply affected by the news. With a meager income as a school teacher, Savitha's financial resources were limited, and the family's savings were quickly depleted by the diagnosis and investigations. Thankfully, the Indian Cancer Society provided vital funds, enabling Savitha to undergo radiotherapy and brachytherapy. Responding well to treatment, she has since completed her regimen and returned to normal life. The family expresses immense relief from the financial stress, profoundly grateful for the support received during this hard time.

Mr. Ganesh More, a 58-year-old male from Alibaug, Maharashtra, running a small shop, faced the challenge of Multiple Myeloma in 2022. As the sole breadwinner from a low socioeconomic background, the cost of a Bone Marrow Transplant seemed insurmountable. With a son aspiring to pursue higher education, the family was financially strained. Tata Memorial Hospital, in collaboration with the Indian Cancer Society, intervened, securing funds for the treatment. After a successful Bone Marrow Transplant in October 2022, Mr. More responded well to the treatment. His son once compelled to abandon studies, has now resumed education. The family expresses profound gratitude to the hospital and Indian Cancer Society for providing Mr. More with a second chance of life.

Thanks to the support under the AKITF funds for Initial Diagnosis & Treatment, Saanchi received urgent medical attention at SRCC Hospital, Mumbai, in September 2023. Early diagnosis facilitated prompt chemotherapy treatment, crucial in addressing her condition swiftly.

His fate took a sudden turn, after he was diagnosed with Pre B-Cell Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia (Pre B-ALL), a type of blood cancer in July 2023 at Sri Shankara Cancer Hospital & Research Centre, Bengaluru. Mohammed's father is an income scrap dealer with modest earnings while his mother is a homemaker. The family faced lot of financial challenges and had almost lost all their hopes in arranging funds for their son's treatment. Fortunately with the support of the Indian Cancer Society-Cancer Cure Fund (ICS-CCF) and its donors timely financial assistance was provided for Mohammed's treatment. Thus with the help of ICS-CCF and its donors Mohammed commenced his cancer treatment journey and responded positively to chemotherapy process. Despite initial treatment, further investigation revealed abnormalities, prompting referral to SKIMS hospital. With his father as the sole breadwinner, employed as a laborer, the family faced financial distress. However, the intervention of the AKITF provided crucial financial assistance for the child's initial treatment, easing the family's burden. Persistent Minimal Residual Disease (MRD) added to the family's ordeal, but with continued medical care, the child eventually tested negative for MRD after four months. To sustain ongoing treatment, they enrolled in the Cancer Cure Fund (CCF), receiving essential financial aid. Now, undergoing treatment and responding positively, the family acknowledges the vital support from medical professionals, AKITF, and CCF, emphasizing the pivotal role of financial assistance in overcoming obstacles to childhood cancer treatment.
